Tapao stated the bakery employee was "fearful for his safety," and surrendered the money bag to the suspect.

Store clerk Jennica Mesa said it was about 10:30 a.m. when her co-worker left through the front door of the Barrigada store with the money bag. But the employee soon came back inside and said, 'I just got jumped.'"

company argues its license is valid and should be grandfathered in. However, the Supreme Court of Guam has ruled that the license agreement is unenforceable.

In 2015 it was thought that the parties had reached an agreement in which GEDA would submit legislation excluding GRRP from the ban and allowing the project to move forward. The agreement stalled.

In November 2017 GRRP sought an order from the court to enforce the 2015 agreement and the case had been headed to trial until Monday.

"We'll set a mediation board with Mr. Thompson" said Aguigui. Attorney Todd Thompson served as mediator the first time it was attempted five years ago.

"We agree," Fisher said on behalf of GEDA. Miller gave her consent as well.

However, before the second attempt at mediation begins, Aguigui told the court that he, Fisher and

wasn't enough of a red flag, the bogus social media account describes Barrett-Anderson, whose real job includes warning consumers to be wary of fraud, as a "grant attorney." The page also misspells attorney as "attroney."

"If you wish there were grants to pay bills then continue reading," so goes part of the pitch on the fake social media account.

The Facebook page also used one of the U.S. Small Business Adminis-

tration Guam Branch's photos from an awards ceremony.

It further falsely described Guam's attorney general as employed by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

Commenters include people who warn others that the Facebook page is a scam, while one poster claimed having paid \$2,000.

The Guam AG's office has been warning people to be wary of offers that are too good to be true.

Barrett-Anderson was not immediately available for comment Monday.

School officials weigh in on budget

There is currently no discussion about furloughs at the Guam Department of Education nor will the department take the position that it would prioritize budget cuts, according to Guam Education Board Chairman Mark Mendiola.

"I'm saying you tell us how much money you're going to give us ... and we're going to come back to you and say yes or no. ... Speaker Benjamin Cruz is well aware of that. We met with him before we left for Washington, D.C., and I shared with him my sentiments," Mendiola said during a news conference Wednesday.

The chairman had stern words for lawmakers who earlier voted by majority to repeal a sales tax partially intended as a dedicated funding source for GDOE. GovGuam now faces a looming budget shortfall come next fiscal year that might be mitigated through another tax increase.

"If you want a good education system, you got to support it," Mendiola said. "The Legislature needs to "If you want a good education system, you got to support it. The Legislature needs to provide a solution. They took that solution away from us, so give us another solution."

Superintendent Jon Fernandez submitted GDOE's testimony on Bills 237-34 and 323-34 after missing the public hearing last week due to meetings with federal education officials.

The two budget bills promise different levels of funding and cost-cutting for GovGuam in fiscal year 2019.

Bill 323 includes a business privilege

tax hike intended to soften the austerity measures while its sister legislation contains no revenue enhancement provisions and proposes millions in spending cuts.

Cruz, chairman of the committee on appropriations, dubbed Bill 323 and 237 the "responsible" and "reckless" bills, respectively.

But regardless of the measure enacted, GDOE would still suffer a reduction in funding compared with fiscal 2018.

The department is throwing its support behind Bill 323, which would lead to a 5 percent or \$13 million reduction, but not without cayeats.

Fernandez said he wanted to exempt teachers from a hiring freeze suggested in both bills. He also asked lawmakers to pass cost-containment and revenue-enhancing initiatives forwarded earlier in the year, when GovGuam faced a similar funding shortfall after the enactment of federal tax cuts.

A temporary increase to the BPT prevented additional cuts to the department at that time. But now, talk of government furloughs is resurfacing as the Legislature tackles next year's

government budget amid a projected \$145 million shortfall.

Mendiola, speaking with Fernandez on Wednesday, said GDOE was not prioritizing furloughs at this time.

"I'm not going to prioritize putting our staff on a fear watch. I understand the reality of it, but at this point in time, we got a job to do," he added,

Fernandez said GDOE would open schools on time, on Aug. 14.

Once the Legislature provides more clarity on next fiscal year's budget, then GDOE can inform senators of its next steps.

At issue is Guam's Adequate Education Act, which opens up appointed, elected and education officials to lawsuit if minimum education standards are not met, Fernandez said.

"The first thing we're going to have to do is whatever resources ... determine if we're able to meet those mandates and ensure we have the resources," he added.

Fernandez said GDOE has been open about its financial position and there should be no surprises about the impact budgets cuts would have on the department.

Airport seeks speedy resolution of Lotte contract

Attorneys for the A,B. Won Pat Guam International Airport Authority Guam on Wednesday filed a motion in the Guam Supreme Court to expedite the process to resolve its disputed retail concession contract with Lotte Duty Free.

Superior Court Judge Arthur Barcinas declared the contract in violation

of procurement law and declared the agreement void in a decision several months ago. The trial court's decision is now on appeal in the Supreme Court.

DFS Guam, which held the retail concession contract before Lotte, has sought to have the trial court's decision enforced.

"With this motion, we're asking that the Supreme Court expedite GIAA's appeal so that we can speedily resolve this litigation that has been so damaging to the financial standing of the airport," Genevieve Rapadas, legal counsel for the airport, stated in a news release Thursday.

"The drastic and unprecedented

order in February 2018 by the Superior Court voided a hugely successful \$154 million public contract and threatens to undermine the financial stability and integrity of the airport," Rapadas stated.

The airport is looking forward to Supreme Court review of the case, the agency added. (Daily Post Staff)
