# **Drug charges filed against** former senior aide's roommate

Charges related to intent to deliver methamphetamine were filed against Julius Ike Aguigui Nedlic, 33, on Tuesday in Superior Court.

Nedlic is the roommate of Troy Torres, former senior aide in the Calvo-Tenorio administration. Torres was arrested but not charged, following a drug raid at a house in Latte Heights last week.

According to the magistrate's complaint, marshals were trying to serve a bench warrant on Nedlic in connection with another case and traveled to an apartment complex in Harmon upon receiving a tip he might be there. When Nedlic emerged from a car in the parking lot of the complex and was approached by law enforcement, he allegedly fled on foot while discarding several bags in his possession in the process.

Upon apprehension, he was found to be in possession of \$2,077 in cash. approximately 2 grams of methamphetamine, 4 grams of suspected marijuana, a digital scale and a glass pipe, court documents state. Nedlic also allegedly claimed ownership of the drugs and money, but stated the car had been rented by another person, identified by a wallet left at the scene with both Nedlic and the other person's driver's license in it. Nedlic indicated he had been residing with that person at another location.

A warrant for that residence in

which Nedlic was residing was then executed and officers discovered in one bedroom another digital scale, a cut plastic straw with drug residue

and plastic packaging also with residue. Another glass pipe, also with residue, was discovered in the living room.

Nedlic was officially charged with felony possession of a Schedule II controlled substance, felony possession of a Schedule II controlled substance with intent to

deliver, and possession of less than an ounce of marijuana.

At a press conference Monday evening, Torres said his car had been repossessed a few days prior to the raid on his residence and he rented a car. He allowed Nedlic to borrow the car the day before the raid, he said.

Torres also said his roommate never returned home and that he later learned Nedlic had been arrested for allegedly possessing 2 grams of methamphetamine and for the outstanding

Torres, a former communications director and former senior policy adviser to the administration who also was working on Sen. Dennis Rodriguez Jr.'s gubernatorial campaign until recently, was released from jail Saturday. He was given a notice to appear in court within three years.

Torres on Monday claimed his arrest was politically motivated and that Lt. Gov. Ray Tenorio, a gubernatorial candidate, wanted him out of politics. Tenorio has denied Torres' allegations.

action," the statement noted.

The seized items continue to be held and will remain with the agency's Property and Evidence Control office until they are properly destroyed.

Responding to allegations that he lacks institutional knowledge to run the agency, Palacios defended

# **DLM director now** requiring disclosure

Department of Land Management Director Michael Borja has instructed his staff to disclose any immediate familial relationships they may have with Chamorro Land Trust Commission lease applicants through a declaration in the applicant's file.

Borja issued the instruction after learning that DLM employees and their relatives were issued land leases for highly sought lots in Barrigada Heights. In particular, Boria was unaware that the land management administrator's daughter was approved for a lease.

"I want a declaration in every folder," Borja said. "It's too late to do anything with the lease. ... But I want that employee to make that declaration so that if I or a future director is looking at the folder to sign, he can see this."

A few DLM employees or their relatives were approved for leases at Barrigada Heights. This includes the director himself, as his sister, Catherine Borja, was one of the applicants approved.

'You've seen the evidence; I haven't

withheld anything. But neither is my sister unqualified nor are any of those other folks unqualified," Borja said.

The lease for Catherine Borja shows that Michael Borja was given power of attorney by his sister and that he signed the agreement both as the director and in his sister's stead in April 2017.

The director said there was "probably not" any regulation or standard that would have prevented him from signing the lease but he would refrain from signing leases for his relatives in the future.

'Could I have done better? Absolutely. Idon't think I did anything wrong. I had full declaration in everything I did. Was my judgement skewed? ... Like I said, if I don't learn this lesson and take it and improve upon it, I'm just shoving it under the rug and ignoring it, and this is not something we shove under the rug," Borja said.

Concern over development in Barrigada Heights and reports of DLM employees or relatives obtaining leases prompted Sen. Frank Aguon Jr., a gubernatorial candidate, to request an oversight hearing on DLM from Sen. Tom Ada, who oversees land matters.

doesn't want me," said Torres, who suggested that his work on Rodriguez's gubernatorial campaign was a threat to Tenorio's own gubernatorial campaign, leading to his arrest.

"I don't micromanage public safety, I don't direct investigations," said Tenorio. "It has nothing to do with politics. Absolutely, categorically, absolutely zero to do with politics."

Puppy statement confirmed

"One thing that he did say that was accurate - I called him a couple of weeks ago and asked for a puppy,"

Torres was released Saturday and told to appear in court within three years. He has not been charged.

Attorney General Elizabeth Barrett-Anderson could not comment directly about the Torres case but said a notice to appear is routinely given to suspects "when the prosecution division needs additional time to review the probable cause to be able to charge a case, to make sure that when we charge, we charge with sufficient evidence."

In felony cases, a notice to appear is three years; in misdemeanor cases. it's one year.

A notice to appear does not mean the charges have been dropped, Barrett-Anderson said, and the allegations may still be brought before a magistrate judge to be charged within the next three years, if sufficient evidence develops.

appointed deputy director of the Department of Corrections, attended the meeting with the HIDTA team which took place Wednesday at the U.S. Attorney's office in Hagatña. McDonald was instrumental in arranging the visit while he was director of the Guam Customs and Ouarantine Agency.

McDonald said the HIDTA team included about a half-dozen representatives from Hawaii and Washington, D.C.

**Theyweremostlyinterestedinseeing** statistical records, said McDonald, of drug-related arrests, drug seizures and drug treatment records in order to determine whether Guam qualifies for HIDTA designation.

"They said 'We need you guys to get all your stats together," said McDonald, "so they can take a look at it and see what they can do to assist us."

If Guam is recognized as a high-intensity drug trafficking area, McDonald said the HIDTA team indicated that additional federal dollars might be available to local law enforcement agencies before the end of this year.

"What needs to happen now," said McDonald, is "the governor has to issue an executive order appointing a

HIDTA executive council." He said the council has to include representatives from Guam's law enforcement, medical and private sectors.

Lt. Gov. Ray Tenorio attended the meeting, said McDonald, along with representatives from the Guam DEA and FBI offices, the U.S. Attorney's office, the Guam Police Department, Guam Customs and DOC. Attorney

General Elizabeth Barrett-Anderson and law enforcement representatives from the CNMI participated by phone, McDonald said.

Edward Talbott, DEA resident agent in charge for the Guam and Saipan office, declined to discuss details of the meeting except to say that "the DEA and federal law enforcement are always exploring avenues with state and local law enforcement counterparts to allocate resources through programs to ensure our community remains safe."

pedestrian en route to Guam Regional Medical City.

On May 6 at 12:02 a.m., police confirmed the pedestrian died from his injuries, Tapao stated.

The driver of the RAV4, who did not want to be named, told The Guam Daily Post that the area was dark and he didn't see the man until it was too late.

"I'm sad because my baby was with me and my girlfriend. We were heading to the airport to welcome back my dad," the driver said.


GPD's Highway Patrol Division is investigating the incident and the pedestrian's death marks the seventh traffic-related fatality this year on Guam's roads.

Guam's poorly lit roads and scarce crosswalks have seen at least four pedestrian fatalities less than halfway through this year.

Tapao said part of the ongoing police investigation is to determine whether speed, alcohol or drugs were factors in the crash.
